Under the auspices of the Asian American & Asian Diaspora Studies (AAADS) Program, JASAC was founded in 2017 by AAADS faculty member Lisa Hirai Tsuchitani to promote a comprehensive and complex understanding of the historical and contemporary, structural and cultural contexts of Japanese American communities. Asian American Research Center (AARC)

After six years of fundraising efforts, capped off by a generous grant from the state of California, the Asian American & Asian Diaspora Studies (AAADS) Program is thrilled to announce the launch of the Asian American Research Center (AARC). The Center will serve as an intellectual hub to advance and support interdisciplinary research about the status and experiences of Asian American ethnic communities

On Friday, October 23, 2020, AARC held an official ribbon-cutting event to mark its launch that drew over 200 attendees. The inaugural event featured a timely presentation by Taeku Lee, the George Johnson Professor of Law and Professor of Political Science, on Asian American Millennial and Gen Z voter beliefs and participation. - Ensure the continued growth and vitality of teaching and research efforts by and about Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders on campus.

She later earned her Master's from SF State in Public Administration with an emphasis on Nonprofit Administration in 2017. Stacy joined the board because she is interested in being part of a multigenerational community of women leaders to support the next generation and uplift our community's history at UC Berkeley and beyond.

She hopes JAWAUCB can play a role in supporting more Japanese American and Asian American women students to take visible and bold leadership and help make sure they have no barriers to becoming leaders. She believes JAWAUCB can work for and invest in a shift of power in our society to ensure all voices are heard and valued and that our history and that of other communities of color are not buried but recognized.

Regarding Stacy's personal interests, she loves reading biographies and oral histories about social justice leaders and movements and enjoys arts and crafts, including sewing, which she learned from her maternal grandmother. She also loves baking cookies and desserts, which she gets from her mother. Other Cal grads in her family include her father and her older sister who is a professor of Japanese literature at Smith College.

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Lynn Nakada is a 1975 Cal graduate in sociology and the 1975 recipient of the Kenneth Priestley Award for Student Leadership. From early on, she was actively involved on campus and after graduation she became a member of the UC Berkeley staff, working in Student Activities and Programs, EOP/Affirmative Action, and Housing and Food Services, and also served as Associate Development Director in University Development and Alumni Relations. In 2006 she received the Chancellor's Outstanding Staff award. As an alumna, while working at Cal, she served as Secretary for the Class of 1975 and as Alumni Advisor for the Mortar Board Senior National Honor Society.

Lynn was the first female member of the Order of the Golden Bear to serve as its Alumni Secretary. She has served two terms on the California Alumni Association (CAA) Board of Directors as well as three terms on the Board of Directors of the Prytanean Alumnae, Inc., proudly serving as President when it was honored as CAA's 2011 Alumni Group of the Year. In 2019, Lynn was named Outstanding Alumna by JAWAUCB.

In 2016, after over 40 years of service to the campus, Lynn retired from Cal. Currently, she volunteers for CAA, John Muir Health in Walnut Creek, and the Pleasant Hill Senior Center. She also serves on the Advisory Board of the UC Berkeley Retirement Center and on the Advisory Committee of Cal's Academic Talent Development Program.

Her personal interests include cooking, Cal athletics, art museums, Japanese performing arts, ballet, Broadway musicals, and jazz. As a child and youth, Lynn performed Japanese dancing, attaining Natori status as a teenager and was conferred the stage name, Sanjo Kanhiro. As a JAWAUCB board member, she sees significant potential for growth in its future.

A Brief History of JAWAUCB



- **1920s, 1930s:** Japanese American women and all people of color studying at Cal faced racial discrimination in housing.
- **Fall 1937:** Following a decade of fundraising within the Japanese American community, seven co-eds and their housemothers moved into the newly purchased, five-bedroom Japanese Women's Students Clubhouse on 2509 Hearst Avenue.
- **1940s:** Executive Order 9066 resulted in the wartime incarceration of Japanese Americans from the West Coast. In 1942, the Clubhouse was rented out until 1945 when it was reopened, first under the supervision of Lillian and Harry Matsumoto and then under the direction of the alumnae board.
- **1960s:** UC Berkeley offered racially integrated coops and dormitories.
- **January 10, 1967:** The Japanese Women's Students Clubhouse was sold for \$72,000. Proceeds from the sale were given by the (Nisei) Board of Directors to the UC Regents for the Japanese Women Alumnae Scholarship Fund. The fund has continued to grow thanks to the generosity of families and friends.
- **1991:** The first Japanese Women's Alumnae (JWA)/UC Berkeley Scholarship luncheon was hosted by Dr. Elsie Sata Baukol, Class of 1971. Keynote speaker, UC Regent Yori Wada, spoke on "The Mission of Higher Education."
- **1992:** Under the leadership of Dr. Yoshiye Togasaki and Dr. Elsie Baukol, the alumnae club became a chartered club of the Cal Alumni Association. The scholarship fund has grown with contributions from members, families and friends. Each year JAWAUCB honors its scholars at a general meeting/luncheon.
- **2020:** To date, in partnership with Cal, the Japanese American Women Alumnae of UCB (JAWAUCB) has awarded 236+ scholarships to undergraduate and graduate Asian American women who are learners, leaders, and contributors.

As a means of preserving the history of Japanese American alumnae at UCB, JAWAUCB conducted a number of oral histories which served as the inspiration for the 38-page monograph, "Lives and Legacy." Keynote Speaker, Satsuki Ina

On October 3, 2020, JAWAUCB hosted our annual scholarship awards event to bring together our membership and the broader community to recognize the inspiring work of our scholarship recipients, and to celebrate the leadership of Japanese American women alumnae in our communities. Due to COVID-19, JAWAUCB postponed the in-person event scheduled in March and shifted the “venue” online to continue our annual tradition and be able to safely come together. About 80 people participated.

During the program, we were honored to have Clothilde Hewlett, the Executive Director of the California Alumni Association (CAA), address our group as a charter club of the Association. We then celebrated five of our scholarship recipients who each were given the opportunity to briefly share about their experiences at UC Berkeley. The students’ studies reflected a wide range of significant work including Applied Mathematics, Society and Environment, Film, History and Computational Biology.


Betty Sasaki Furuta was honored as our 2020 Outstanding Alumna in recognition of her academic career, professional accomplishments, and service to the...

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...community. Betty graduated cum laude with a BS in nursing from UCSF in 1957 and subsequently earned a MS in nursing in 1959. She served in numerous capacities during her illustrious career at UCSF, including Coordinator of Academic Services and Special Studies, Assistant Dean of Student and International Academic Services, and Assistant Clinical Professor in the Department of Mental Health. In 1995, Betty was recruited by the Kawasaki University of Mental Health in Kurashiki, Japan, where she spent eight years as a professor and administrator. Betty has served on the JAWA Board of Directors for over ten years in various positions, and has long served her community as a volunteer in the reading program for elementary students.

Finally, Satsuki Ina was our featured keynote speaker who offered a talk entitled “Social Justice and Community Healing.” Satsuki started her comments by sharing about her own experience as a student at UC Berkeley during the Free Speech Movement, learning about the power of protest. Today, Satsuki is applying the lessons about protest in her current work with Tsuru for Solidarity, which is focused on ending immigration policies that have separated and incarcerated families seeking asylum. Through Tsuru, she is working to highlight the parallels between Japanese American incarceration during WWII and present day anti-immigrant policies, with a commitment to support people to heal through the trauma of racism.

The event truly exemplified our vision: “To inspire and support Asian American women as learners, leaders and contributors to local and global communities in the spirit of our founding Japanese American women alumnae.” Thank you to all who participated!

UC Berkeley Homecoming 2020: Lives and Legacy- Celebrating Japanese American Women at Cal



As part of Cal's 2020 Homecoming events, JAWAUCB was honored to present a multigenerational panel entitled, "Lives and Legacy: Celebrating Japanese American Women at Cal" on October 17th. This virtual discussion was moderated by Dr. Lisa Tsuchitani and featured alumnae Joyce Nao Takahashi (Class of '55), Shirley Kazuyo Muramoto (Class of '77), Nina F. Ichikawa, (Class of '00) and Sarena Kuhn (Class of '22).

Each of the panelists offered a different and unique story about why she came to Cal, relating fascinating details about the campus culture at the time of their attendance at Berkeley. When Joyce Takahashi attended Cal, for example, there were no women faculty in the Physical Sciences. Shirley Muramoto was the first woman to join the ROTC (Reserve Officers' Training Corps), while Nina Ichikawa restarted the Nikkei Student Union. Sarena Kuhn has had to deal with the pandemic and virtual classes. In spite of the differences in their experiences, a common theme...

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...all panelists shared was how Cal helped shape their identities and provided new and broad opportunities academically, personally and professionally.

Janet Daijogo is a veteran kindergarten teacher at Marin Country Day School, having taught children for over 40 years. She incorporates Aikido, a noncompetitive form of martial art, in her teaching and attributes her journey in teaching and Aikido as a mental practice where she found her space and purpose. Her story is featured in *Berkeley Online*, October 9, 2020 to mark UCB's 150th anniversary of women on campus. The article's author cites her for openly speaking about the mental challenges of stressful life events and the importance of self-care and patience, noting that "[h]er vulnerable story reminds us that that life is a journey of continued learning, and we are all along for the ride."

Satsuki Ina, PhD, was awarded an American Psychological Association (APA) 2020 Presidential Citation for her dedication and lifelong achievement for the Japanese American community in researching and treating the long-term health implications of those individuals who were wrongly incarcerated during World War II. APA recognized her work with Tsuru for Solidarity in solidarity with other communities that have experienced forced removal, detention, deportation, and the separation of families.
